## Comments of Thomas O'Rourke, Chairman of the Yurok Tribe, regarding issues to be considered in the development of the California Fish and Wildlife Strategic Vision

## September 2, 2011

An overarching issue that should be addressed in the California Fish and Wildlife Strategic Vision is acknowledgement of the unique Co-Management relationship that Tribes have with the State of California, and identification of a process that will recognize and maximize the benefits of this Co-Management relationship for the resource, the Tribes, the State, and the stakeholders.

Issues that are of specific importance for the Natural Resource Stewardship group include the following:

- 1) Tribal rights especially in regard to meeting subsistence needs within MLPA areas.
- Implementation of natural resource agreements that have been reached between diverse user groups; such as the Klamath Basin Restoration Agreement and the Klamath Hydro-electric Agreement.
- 3) Collaboration amongst Co-Managers and partners to conserve, restore, and manage natural resources; especially during times of limited financial resources.
- 4) Collaborative prioritization of restoration needs/actions so that limited resources are most efficiently used.
- 5) Shared visions/goals for natural resource management amongst the Co-Managers.
- 6) Ecosystem, rather than single species (typically ESA driven) management.
